Course Description: General Psychology is a survey of the essential subject areas, major theories and approaches to the scientific study of behavior and mental processes.

Course Purpose/Rationale/Goal: To acquaint students with the diverse field of psychology including major theoretical concepts. In addition, introduce methods of research used and how it contributes to the body of knowledge in psychology, promotion of critical thinking, generation of new ideas, and consideration of alternate explanations when evaluating information.

Course Requirements: To maximize the potential to complete this course, students should attend all class meetings and/or login to internet courses at least twice weekly. In addition, satisfactorily complete all homework assignments and examinations in a timely manner, and satisfactorily complete all other projects or papers as assigned in the course specific instructions.

Course Evaluation: See the instructor's course information sheet for specific items used in evaluating student performance.

Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs)/Competencies:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

1. Identify various research methods and their characteristics used in the scientific study of psychology.
2. Describe the historical influences and early schools of thoughts that shaped the field of psychology.
3. Describe some of the prominent perspectives and approaches used in the study of psychology
4. Use terminology unique to the study of psychology.
5. Describe accepted approaches and standards in psychological assessment and evaluation.
6. Identify factors in physiological and psychological processes involved in human behavior.

Core Objectives addressed:

- **Communication skills-** includes effective written, oral and visual communication.
- **Critical thinking skills-** includes creative thinking, innovation, inquiry and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information.
- **Empirical and Quantitative skills-** to include the manipulation and analysis of numerical data or observable facts resulting in informed conclusions.

- **Social Responsibility-** to include demonstrated intercultural knowledge and competence, knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national and global communities.

Attendance Policy: Students are expected to attend all classes in order to be successful in a course. The student may be administratively withdrawn from the course when absences become excessive as defined in the course syllabus. When an unavoidable reason for class absence arises, such as illness, an official trip authorized by the college or an official activity, the instructor may permit the student to make up work missed. It is the student's responsibility to complete work missed within a reasonable period of time as determined by the instructor. Students are officially enrolled in all courses for which they pay tuition and fees at the time of registration. Should a student, for any reason, delay in reporting to a class after official enrollment, absences will be attributed to the student from the first class meeting. Students who enroll in a course but have "Never Attended" by the official census date, as reported by the faculty member, will be administratively dropped by the Office of Admissions and Records. A student who does not meet the attendance requirements of a class as stated in the course syllabus and does not officially withdraw from that course by the official census date of the semester, may be administratively withdrawn from that course and receive a grade of "X" or "F" as determined by the instructor.

Instructors are responsible for clearly stating their administrative drop policy in the course syllabus, and it is the student's responsibility to be aware of that policy.

It is the student's responsibility to verify administrative drops for excessive absences through MySPC using his or her student online account. If it is determined that a student is awarded financial aid for a class or classes in which the student never attended or participated, the financial aid award will be adjusted in accordance with the classes in which the student did attend/participate and the student will owe any balance resulting from the adjustment.

Campus Carry Policy: The 84th Texas legislature passed Senate Bill 11, commonly known as the "campus carry" bill went into effect on August 1, 2017. Individuals holding a licensed to carry (LTC) or concealed handgun license (CHL) holders will have the legal right to carry a concealed handgun onto community college campuses; however, they **cannot** openly carry the handgun. What Concealed Carry Allows:

- The law permits only licensed to carry (LTC) holders or concealed handgun license (CHL) holders to carry concealed handguns on campuses.
- Allows an institution to adopt rules or regulations that prohibit license holders from carrying concealed handguns on certain areas of campus, in a building or portion of a building as long as the rules and regulations do not have the effect of generally prohibiting a license holder from carrying a concealed handgun on campus. Effective notice must be provided with respect to any place where handguns may not be carried.

What Concealed Carry Does Not Allow:

- The law does **not** allow "open carry" on college campuses. Open carry means the intentional display of a handgun, including the carry of a partially or wholly visible handgun stored in a shoulder or belt holster.
- The law does not allow the carry of rifles or shotguns on college campuses.

Pursuant to PC 46.035, the open carrying of handguns is prohibited on all South Plains College campuses. Report violations to the College Police Department at 806-716-2396 or 9-1-1.

Classroom Policies:

- **Respect for Fellow Students:** All students will maintain respect for fellow classmates' personal beliefs, values, morals and life situations. Attendance Policy and Grades: If a student misses more than 5 classes during the semester, I consider that excessive absences and she/he may be dropped from the class. In addition, when you miss class you will miss topics we discuss in class that may be included on exams whether or

not they are covered in the textbook. At the end of the semester, if a student has a borderline grade, I will use the student's attendance record to determine the student's final grade. If you have an emergency that interferes with attendance, you must notify me ASAP to determine how to keep up with the class, or whether you will be dropped or need to withdraw.

Late Arrivals and Late or Missed Work: Your work is due on the dates assigned and will have late penalties if that date is missed. You cannot wait until the end of the semester to do the work. At the start of class I will take attendance, pass out handouts, make announcements, and have students turn in work and/or complete a quiz or activity to demonstrate their preparation for class. Students who arrive after a quiz or activity has ended will not be able to make it up. Late students are also responsible for making sure they are marked as present.

Blackboard and Class Materials: Throughout the semester you are required to access class materials using Blackboard. You will need a reliable, internet-ready computer to retrieve these materials. If you do not have a personal computer or printer, you may use the **computer labs on campus**. These labs are located in building 2 (room 207), building 4 (between rooms 450 and 451), and building 8 (room 827 and the library). There is also a lab at the Lubbock Center, 39th and Ave. Q (room 109) available to SPC students with an ID.

In-Class Activities/Exercises: During class we will review the basic ideas from a chapter, and then delve deeper into the topic by completing discussions, activities and exercises. In-class activities cannot be made up if you are absent. Each student is expected to be prepared for each class by completing the reading and written assignments in Blackboard and completing any other additional papers or projects required.

Exams: There will be four exams and they will take place every 3-4 weeks. Exams may contain around 50 multiple choice questions and an essay question. Each exam is worth 100 points for a total of 400 points. The fourth exam is the final exam, and it will take place during final exam week. The final exam is not cumulative. All four exams will count toward your final grade.

During exams everything you brought to class that day will be kept out of sight the entire time. This includes all electronic devices (i.e., cell phones, tablets, laptops, etc.), notebooks, backpacks, and purses. No hats or "headgear" of any kind will be worn, including headphones. If any items are not kept out of sight during an exam, your exam will be picked up and you will receive a 0.

If a student misses an exam, he/she is required to schedule and complete a make-up exam within one week (7 calendar days) of the original exam date. If a student does not complete a make-up exam according to the above policy, the exam grade will be a zero.

Project/Paper: This is worth 100 points and will be due by Wednesday, November 20, 2019. If it is late it will have 10% deducted per day that it is late. The description is on a separate sheet with a grading rubric that is attached. You can turn the paper in earlier, but this is the deadline.

Quizzes: I will randomly give daily reading quizzes that will be handed out at the beginning of a class period. There may be as many as 25 of these quizzes during the semester. They will be over the reading assigned for that week. They will be worth 5 points each. If you are late to class you will miss the quiz and there are no make-up quizzes. These quizzes will also help prepare you for the exam and you might see some of the same questions on the exams.

There may be a few opportunities for extra credit work, and those will be announced during class.

Final Grades will be determined by calculating the total amount of points earned by you this semester. If the total amount of possible points to earn changes due to the number of quizzes given, the appropriate adjustments will be made to the grading scale.

Using the scale below, your instructor will determine the corresponding letter grade. This scale may be adjusted if there is a change in the total possible points. *This will only occur if there are fewer than 25 quizzes across the semester.
