GENERAL COURSE INFORMATION:

<u>Course Description</u>: An introduction to basic pole climbing techniques including ascending and descending a 35 ft. utility pole safely, using the approved OSHA required fall arrest equipment.

<u>Course Learning Outcomes</u>: The goals/objectives of this course are:

Learn the proper care and inspection of climbing gear.

Demonstrate different techniques of proper pole inspections and identify climbing hazards.

Perform pole top hurt man rescue within the required four minutes.

Demonstrate basic knot tying used in rigging of different line apparatuses on poles.

Demonstrate the ability to ascend and descend a utility pole safely.

<u>Course Competencies</u>: Upon successful completion of this course, each student will have demonstrated through actual climbing:

Basic Wooden Pole climbing knowledge.

Personal Climbing tools and equipment.

Pole top hurt man rescue.

Perform a cross-arm change-out
