Course Description: A survey of the social, political, economic, cultural, and intellectual history of the United States from the pre-Columbian era to the Civil War/Reconstructions period. United States History I includes the study or pre-Columbian, colonial, revolutionary, early national, slavery and sectionalism, and the Civil War/Reconstruction eras. Themes that may be addressed in United States History I include: American settlement and diversity, American culture, religion, civil and human rights, technological change, economic change, immigration and migration, and the creation of the federal government.

Course Purpose: To offer students a solid foundation course in the principles and important events and ideas in American history. This course will prepare students for further study in other social science courses.

Course Requirements: Students should attend all class meetings, complete all homework assignments and examinations at the times assigned, complete projects in a manner consistent with college-level work, read assignments thoroughly, and be prepared for all class discussions.

Course Objectives:

1. Critical thinking - students should demonstrate creative thinking, innovation, inquiry and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information appropriate for a college-level course.

2. Communication - students will effective develop, interpret, and express their ideas through written, oral, and visual communication.

3. Social responsibility - students will demonstrate intercultural competence, a knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities.

4. Personal responsibility - students will demonstrate their abilities to connect choices, actions and consequences to ethical decision-making.

6. Take written exams consisting of multiple choice, fill-in-the-blank, and essay questions.

7. Work on projects and writing assignments that assimilate readings, notes, discussions, and personal research.

Class attendance: Students will abide by the written policies of Seagraves ISD. No absences for extracurricular activities will excuse assignments given nor will due dates be compromised.
